EAC Social Responsibility - UNESCO Run for Peace

"I want a 'purple run' in Hong Kong". It all started with this vision which UMW East Asia centre director Christina Siu shared with me at the social responsibility dinner in early 2018. This led to Manchester MBA supporting UNESCO Hong Kong's Run for Peace in December 2018, in which UMW was a sponsoring organisation. They walked the walk (ran, rather!), with my MBA Alumni taking awards for their team effort.

UNESCO, short for The United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, is a specialised agency of the United Nations, dedicated to education, science and culture. The organisation promotes the UN's 17 Sustainable Development Goals. Amongst other goals such as innovation, fighting poverty, and gender equality, promoting peace and sustainable development has been a priority on UNESCO Hong Kong's agenda.

According to UNESCO Hong Kong, "Run for Peace" was a way to promote and increase awareness of peace, including social peace, political peace, individual peace, cultural peace, and ecological peace.
